We had it booked back in 2020, but of course we all know how plans change due to Covid. But now, two years later, we've finally getting to go. We prefer Disney cruise line over most others, largely because we're a Disney family, and have been since 2000, when we invested in Disney Vacation Club, a program we still love and enjoy to this day.

When my wife and I relocated to the Schuyler County area seven years ago, we said that now that we had found the perfect summer location, that we'd never leave Watkins Glen for a summer vacation ever again... why should we when we have the best of summer right here? But alas, we came to appreciate that many other locations are beautiful in the summer as well, so we've had to adapt.



Still, it breaks my heart to be leaving here for what will be about two weeks, while my sailboat sits in her slip, awaiting some TLC, and some Seneca Lake time.

Did you know that the Erie Canal, including Seneca Lake and the Cayuga-Seneca Canal, are now part of New York State Canalway Water Trail? In celebration of Great Outdoors Month and National Trails Day on June 4th, Secretary of the Interior Deb Haaland recently announced the designation of nine new national recreation trails in seven states, adding nearly 600 miles to the National Trails System. The newly designated trails join a network of more than 1,300 existing national recreation trails, which can be

found in every U.S. state, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico. The newly recognized New York State Canalway Water Trail is comprised of over 450 miles of land cut canals, and interconnected lakes and rivers with more than 150 public access points for boaters and paddlers. The water trail follows the New York State Canal System across the full expanse of upstate New York, including our own Seneca Cayuga canal and the Oswego and Champlain spurs. Will this change anything for us? Not likely, although more recognition might translate into more use, but I'm not too worried. I just think it's cool that our little piece of heaven here in the Finger Lakes is recognized for its excellent recreational opportunities and natural beauty, two benefits worth protecting.

The other big canal news was also released lately. According to Governor Kathy Hochul's office, New York State has been selected by Inland Waterways International as the host of the 2025 World Canals Conference, an event that brings together hundreds of canal and inland waterway enthusiasts, professionals and scholars from around the world to learn about a variety of topics related to canals. The 2025 conference will be held in Buffalo as the State commemorates the 200th anniversary of the Erie Canal's opening there in 1825. The New

York Power Authority, New York State Canal Corporation, and the Erie Canalway National Heritage Corridor, in partnership with the Erie Canal Harbor Development Corporation and Visit Buffalo Niagara, are the joint sponsors and will be coordinating all aspects of the conference. Bring it on!

Did you see the press last month for Safe Boating Week that highlighted our PFD trees and the services our club offers to boaters in the area? For a small investment of club funds, we were able to furnish PFDs for families that maybe can't afford one, or left them at home, while they kayak or boat in our area. It's those kinds of community service that make the Finger Lakes a destination for families, boating enthusiasts and wine junkies everywhere.

Lastly, I just want to put a plug in for our summer rendezvous up at Sampson State Park in late July. It promises to be an excellent adventure and one packed with educational opportunities for boaters to learn more about safe boating while having a little fun. I look forward to seeing all our members participate, although I'm sure some of you may have other plans that weekend. In any event, I'll see you down on the docks!

Sampson Boater Weekend

As you probably know, ABC-FLX will be heading to Sampson for the weekend of July 29, 30 and 31. On Friday, Boats will sail/motor from Watkins Glen to Sampson State Park Marina. There is a food truck there and live band at the Vista for sunset right above the lake. During the trip to Sampson, we will be conducting the Coastal Navigator Certification for one of the boats. This includes Navigation both with paper charts and electronic Chart Plotter Systems.

On Saturday, we will be providing Hands-On-Training (HOT) on your boat (or ours) for the skills leading up to Inland Navigator Certification – These are basic boater safety, basic boat handling, leaving the dock, anchoring, returning to the dock and cover a variety of skills from engine operations to VHF radios and marine electronics. For those who have the experience and the skills already, we will be conducting the Inland Navigator Certification testing. On Saturday night, we are planning for a pitch in cook-out right on the dockside area of Sampson Marina. Bring a dish to pass. If you are not available for the whole weekend, plan to drive up to Sampson to take part in any of the events on Saturday.

Sunday will be the trip back to Watkins Glen and another certification for a Coastal Navigator. If you are an ABC-FLX instructor and available to help with the "hands on" classes or an ABC-FLX member with an interest in building hands on boating skills at any level, please let me know. To make a reservation for a boat slip contact <u>Marina - Seneca Lake</u> <u>Resorts</u> To make a reservation for training or certification please send me a note by July 15th. Should be a terrific weekend!

Classes

We have an ABC class planned for August 18th, 25th and 27th in the member facility at the Watkins Glen Yacht Club. See the class listing for details. We are also looking to continue to offer our classes across the Finger Lakes Region. I am working on setting up a class for a Seneca Lake organization in Geneva this month.

We completed our Sail class last week and had a total of 13 students that attended the classes. Exams have been completed and we expect great results as the students worked very hard to absorb the sailing terminology and skills. The sail class is a fundamental class for anyone wishing to take a sailboat on the water. We work to avoid getting "in irons" but are able to get out when the inevitable occurs. We focused the students on theory, principles and basics learning for a couple sessions, then for three Friday evenings they were out "on the water" developing the skills they have been taught.

We are conducting the Engine Maintenance class for 10 weeks starting July 11th. This class covers inboards and outboards, diesel and gasoline engines, and their maintenance. It is a comprehensive class and provides the students with an excellent manual to future reference for boat maintenance and repair tasks. Engine Maintenance is a required class to achieve "Inland Navigator" Certification in the Boat Operator Certification (BOC) Program. Take a look at your schedule for Monday evenings this summer and consider this class.

Seminars

We are also planning several seminars this July that are required for the Coastal Navigator Certification. *Mariners Compass, Anchoring* and *Navigation Rules* are 2hour sessions that provide an update on these topics and an opportunity to refresh your skills. Look for emails from me as we get these seminars on the schedule.

As always, this USPS National Boat Safety organization is really all about you, our members. We want to support you in any way we can to become skilled, capable, and confident on the water. Please take a careful look at the long-term class list later in this newsletter. Our class schedules are now set up by skill level targeted by the individual member. From our America's Boating Club basic boating safety education course (now required in New York State to operate a powerboat) to Celestial Navigation we have the materials, skills and instructors required to teach every class imaginable.

lions of Americans who own a kayak – or two?

According to Paddling Magazine, the pandemic, with its shutdowns and social distancing, saw the largest boom in paddlesports history. The website Statista.com

reports 18.12 million people kayaked in 2020, up more than 2 million from 2019's number of 16.62 million.

Kayaking is watersport that has so much going for it: It's good for you physically. It's good for you mentally. It gets you outside and on the water. It's fairly affordable, and if you don't want to buy, you can rent.

Many kayak rental businesses are located in the Finger Lakes Region. And there are many opportunities to enjoy the sport alone or with like-minded folks. The Finger Lakes Museum in Branchport, for example, offers several kayak experiences on Keuka Lake throughout the summer. Check out the schedule at <u>www.finger-</u><u>lakesmuseum.org/events</u>. They even offer lessons.

Knowing the basics of kayaking safety is crucial, whether you're enjoying a small pond or a big lake; a canal or a river. Our chapter of America's Boating Club has offered courses in the past. (That's how I became a member!)

Internet sites tell us that kayaks were developed centuries ago, with archeologists dating the oldest discovered kayak to be around 4000 years old. People who lived in the regions presently known as Canada, Greenland and Alaska are believed to be the first people

to use what we would recognize as a kayak. The word kayak originally meant "hunter boat," as they were likely in hunting sea creatures such as fish and seals.

America's Boating Course (ABC)

America's Boating Course (ABC) An 8-hour introductory course that will satisfy the Boater's Safety requirements for New York State as well as put you on the path to becoming a more knowledgeable (and safer) boater. This class includes an optional "on-the-water" section leaving from the Watkins Glen Marina.

Seminar – Rules of the Road: A Practical Approach

Rules of the Road is offered as a seminar and as part of the Boat Handling course.

Navigational rules of the road help you know what to do when you share the water with other boats, how to recognize and signal intentions, and how to avoid collision. This seminar focuses in a practical way on helping you understand the basic rules encountered by recreational boaters during most every boating outing and the rules most likely to apply in the local waters where you boat. It covers skipper responsibilities, general rules and definitions, rules to avoid collision, lights and shapes, and sound and light signals.

This self-study seminar consists of a comprehensive 42-page PDF Student Guide and a fully narrated online learning module which present like classroom PowerPoint presentations but give the student total control of the pace and sequence of the slides. Ask your local squadron about on-the-water coaching to help you practice recognizing local situations, the rules that apply, and the actions you should take. And be sure to read the United States Coast Guard's *Navigational Rules and Regulations Handbook* for the authoritative word on all rules of the road, since - as the skipper or designated crew member - you are responsible to know the rules that apply anywhere you boat.

Seminar – Achoring with Assurance

Anchoring with Assurance is offered as a seminar and as part of the *Boat Handling* course.

Anchoring is the skill of securing your vessel to the bottom through the use of line, chain, and one or more anchors. Whether it's for fishing, swimming, a lunch break, or an overnight stop, one of the real pleasures in boating is "hanging on the hook" in some quiet spot. Emergencies such as loss of power, equipment breakdown or failure, or weather hazard may also require that your boat be anchored for a time.

Good seamanship demands that all boaters know how to anchor safely. Our anchoring topics begin with how to select an anchorage and how to anchor depending on conditions. After learning how anchors should be used, you will know if yours are satisfactory or - if you don't already have equipment - what kind(s) to buy. The seminar covers useful anchoring tips and tricks and concludes by discussing how to moor and raft safely. Also included is how to use and tie the two knots most often used when anchoring: the anchor bend and the figure-eight knot.

This self-study seminar consists of a comprehensive 38-page PDF Student Guide and a fully narrated online learning module which present like classroom PowerPoint presentations but give the student total control of the pace and sequence of the slides.

Ask your local squadron about on-the-water coaching to help you practice your skills with assurance, so you don't get carried away.



A Modern-Day Noah

84-Year-Old Spends 40 Years Building Huge Wooden Boat in His Garage—And He's Still Working on It

Bill Hable was 47 when he started building himself a boat. Now the former mechanical engineer from Bloomer, Wisconsin, is 84 years old — and still working on it.

The magnificent 41-foot wooden schooner is kept in a large boathouse Hable built at his home. Every week, three days a week, he takes himself into the shed and immerses himself in the mammoth, decades-long project.

So, when is it expected to be done?

"Don't ask", Hable told The Epoch Times. "I don't know if I'll ever get it done."

Talking to the skilled craftsman, it quickly became apparent the appeal of his undertaking lay in the journey, more so than the destination.

"The purpose of it was to get physical exercise," he said.

In the fall of 1984, Hable was an engineer with a desk job. He worked his way through college helping build and repair boats, and later found himself with 70 acres of land,

cutting firewood, and relishing the activity.

"I had always wanted to build a boat, but I never got around to it," he recalled. "I didn't get enough exercise, so I said, well, why don't I build this boat I've always dreamed about?"

Hable decided the vessel should be big enough to allow him to retire free of debt. So, on January 4, 1985, he went into his woods and cut down the first trees for his schooner.

"Then I cut more trees, and milled the lumber for about 75 to 80 percent of it," he said. "It was supposed to be 15 years -I wanted to retire at 62. Well, I'm 84 now and I'm not retired yet."

Estimated to weigh around 24,000 pounds when it finally hits the water, and holding beds for seven people, the vessel has taken a ton of time and money. When asked how much he has spent on it, Hable shrugs.

"I did not keep track of time, money, or anything else. I'll tell you why: it's been worth it and I didn't want to ... I didn't care," he said.

"If I had a guess, I'd say I've probably spent \$70,000-\$80,000. I spent a lot on epoxy glue, and hardware. And I bought a diesel motor — that was quite expensive."

Hable and his boat have received a good deal of attention over the decades.

"We're located right in Bloomer, next to a restaurant and a bar. People come over and talk to me all the time," he said. "I get visitors from literally all over the world."

Sometimes, different groups make arrangements to come in, and Hable takes them on a tour.

"I taught at the University of Wisconsin in Eau Claire, for nine years. So I like to teach,

and I enjoy doing that," the engineer explained.

Crediting his education, Hable says he had "a very, very good industrial arts teacher in high school" who taught him woodworking, and some of the skills he still uses today. He also spends a lot of time just figuring things out.

"You spend about a third of your time

just thinking about how you're going to do things," he told the newspaper.

The most difficult part to build was the frame for the transit. Hable got a stack of books to help him, but says they each gave conflicting advice.

"I did not like any of the answers. So I sat, literally sat and thought for two weeks. And I finally got it built and it came out perfect," he recalled.

Hable met his wife — who was born in upstate New York and is talented in floral design artwork — while he was at college. But clearly, his sailboat project he prefers to work on solo.



"About 95 percent of the time, it was just me. But for three months in the summertime," he said. "over three summers, my brother and my cousin would come and help strip-plank the boat. You can't use epoxy in the wintertime because it's too cold "

The ultimate plan, Hable says, is to take the finished item to an island in the middle of the local yacht club, where he already has a 49-foot sailboat.

"That's where I plan to launch it if I ever get around to it. The work is just taking longer than expected and slowing up a little bit," he shared.
