HOB - Hat Over Board!

We were on the lake the other day and the wind was blowing about 8-10 from the north. We were on a starboard tack and this gust of wind suddenly caught hold of the brim of my hat and blew it into the air. This wasn't just any hat, this was my Watkins Glen hat, the only hat that seems to fit my fat head and the one that brags about the best place on earth. I'd been meaning to wash it because it's been through a lot, but I hadn't quite gotten to that yet...and then it hit the water.

I turned to Judy and authoritatively said... "Man Overboard drill!" I then appointed her as spotter and told her to not take her eye off the hat. Of course, it's a hat, difficult to see once it got wet and partially submerged, but she tried hard. I proceeded to come about and home in on the reported location. By this point Judy was spotting from the bow and with a bit of good luck, was able to retrieve the



hat with a boat hook. Whew... that was close!

This story had a happy ending and is admittedly silly, however it did prompt me to ask myself what I'd do in the case of a real man overboard (MOB) situation.

We've covered the subject in Seamanship and Boat Handling classes, and I know some of us have actually had to use their MOB training right here in Seneca Lake, but I dare say not many skippers practice MOB drills. It would be helpful if they did.

I then asked my new best friend, ChatGPT to outline the primary benefits of practicing MOB drills and received the following:

1-Emergency Preparedness: Man overboard drills are designed to simulate the sudden and

unexpected event of a person falling into the water. By regularly practicing these drills, boaters become better prepared to handle emergencies efficiently. Through repetition, individuals develop the necessary skills to react quickly, maintain composure, and implement effective rescue procedures. This preparedness significantly increases the chances of a successful rescue, potentially saving lives.

2-Rapid Response and Recovery: In a man overboard situation, time is of the essence. Every second counts when it comes to locating and recovering the *individual in the water. By* practicing man overboard drills, recreational boaters develop their ability to initiate an immediate response. They learn how to promptly raise the alarm, maneuver the boat towards the person overboard, deploy lifesaving equipment such as buoys or life rings, and execute retrieval techniques effectively. These drills enhance coordination among crew members and facilitate a swift and coordinated rescue operation.

3-Crew Coordination and Communication: Recreational boating often involves multiple individuals working together as a team. Man overboard drills serve as an excellent opportunity to enhance crew coordination and communication. These drills emphasize the importance of assigning specific roles and responsibilities to each crew member during an emergency. By practicing the drills, boaters learn how to effectively communicate instructions,

coordinate search patterns, and execute rescue maneuvers in a synchronized manner. These skills translate into improved teamwork, fostering a safer boating environment.

4-Familiarity with Safety **Equipment**: Man overboard drills enable boaters to familiarize themselves with various safety equipment onboard. From life jackets and personal locator beacons to rescue lines and throw bags, recreational boaters can learn how to properly use and deploy these devices during a drill. Familiarity with safety equipment ensures boaters can respond swiftly and effectively in a real emergency, maximizing the chances of a successful rescue and minimizing risks to all involved.

5-Increased Confidence and Reduced Panic: Accidents can induce panic and impair decisionmaking abilities. Regular practice of man overboard drills instills confidence and helps boaters overcome fear or anxiety associated with emergencies. By rehearsing the procedures and techniques required in such situations, individuals become more self-assured and better equipped to handle stressful scenarios. This confidence enables quick decision-making and reduces the likelihood of panic, leading to more effective response and increased safety.

So, there you have it, the five best reasons to practice MOB responses.

Over a cocktail that evening, Judy and I contemplated how much fun – and how instructive – it might be if we held a MOB "contest"

Boating season is well underway, and the marina is bustling

with boats and people and festivities planned for the Summer. In the midst of all this. ABC-FLX is busily engaging boaters in the many courses offered by the club. You may have noticed the instructors and students gathering beneath the mast near the parking lot.

The range of subjects is comprehensive, and any of them will improve your seamanship.

Several Watkins Glen Yacht Club members mentioned that they know of others who need their boater's card, so I expect to run the class again.

Life Jacket Loaner Trees Contribute to Boating Safety

WATKINS GLEN (June 9, 2023)

– The Finger Lakes Chapter of
America's Boating Club (ABC-FLX) is helping to ensure a safe
water experience for area
residents and visitors to Seneca
Lake with two life jacket trees in
Watkins Glen.

The structures are at the Clute Park boat launch on the canal and at the park's kayak and canoe launch at the southeast end of the lake. They hold life jackets of all sizes that may be borrowed and returned at no cost. The boating safety project was launched in 2019.

Programs such as offering life jackets for loan are crucial to boating safety, said Phil Cherry, commander for ABC-FLX, formerly known as the Seneca Sail and Power Squadron.

The boating club, based in Watkins Glen, also is committed to promoting boating safety through offering a wide variety of classes in person, on the water and online, Cherry said.

"Anyone interested in joining the club is welcome," he said. "Please check out our website for a list of current and future boating

Offshore Navigation – July 2023

Also known as *Junior Navigation*, this course is the first of two classes that will teach you the art and science of navigating by the stars. *Junior Navigation* will focus on position determination using the sun while the broader concepts of celestial navigation are presented. Stars, planets, and

the Moon will be added into the student's celestial toolkit later on in the *Navigation* course.

Topics covered in *Junior Navigation* include:

- Precise time determination
- Use of the *Nautical Almanac*
- Taking sextant sights of the sun
- Reducing sights to establish lines of position
- Special charts and plotting sheets for offshore navigation
- Offshore navigational routines for recreational craft
- Electronic and computerized offshore navigation

In *Junior Navigation*, you will continue to use GPS as the primary position sensor, as you learned to do in *Marine Navigation* and *Advanced Marine Navigation*. However, the offshore environment poses many different elements for

consideration by the navigator. Ocean currents, wind, and sea state all affect a vessel's performance over the longer passages.

Also, visible terrestrial landmarks are no longer available to the navigator as reference points. In the Junior Navigation course, you will learn to substitute the sun as a reference point. The course begins with the study of celestial navigation, teaching you to take sights on the sun with a marine sextant, and derive a line of position from that observation. Next, you will apply the principles learned in Advanced Piloting, and plot a running fix from two sun sights taken about four hours apart. Once you have learned the basics of celestial sight reduction, the course continues with planning, positioning, and checking your position in the offshore environment, using both electronic and celestial tools.

There are two examination elements for the *Junior*Navigation course: the Sight
Folder and an Open Book Exam.
The sight folder is graded at the squadron level. The Sight
Certification Form must be submitted with the completed open book exam for the exam to be evaluated when it is submitted to Headquarters.

When/Where: Sextant handling sessions will be held in late July at the Watkins Glen Village Marina. Exact dates will be communicated directly to all students that sign up.

A full-blown "field trip" will be on Saturday, July 29th, at the Sampson State Park Marina where the class will begin collecting data needed for their sight folder.

Additional sight-taking outings will occur on Saturdays in August and early September at the Watkins Glen Village Marina.

Classroom sessions will be held on Wednesday evenings at the Schuyler County Human Resources Building in Montour Falls beginning on September 27th at 7:00 pm. Classes will continue through December 6th and will conclude with a 2-week takehome exam.

Prerequisites: Advanced Marine Navigation (AP) or equivalent.

Cost: \$155 (USPS members), \$255 (nonmembers). Discounts available for multiple family members.

Students should also plan/budget on purchasing the following:

• GPS AntiSpoof app \$20
